Domestic Violence Facts

- 1 in 4 women will experience domestic violence in her lifetime.
- Almost 1/3 of all female homicides in the United Sates are perpetrated by an intimate-partner.
- In New York State alone, approximately
 450,000 domestic incidents are reported to police departments annually.
- According to the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services, there were 91 intimate-partner homicides in the state during the course of 2008—a 25% escalation in deadly crimes against women, compared to 2007.
- Between September of 2004 and December 2011, 14 Orange County women were murdered by their husbands or intimate-partners. One woman is still missing.





2011 Program Highlights

- The Orange County Family Justice Center (FJC):
 Acting as the front door to Safe Homes' comprehensive services, the FJC provides case management, access to legal services, and a Children's Drop-Off Center.
- Teen Dating-Violence Prevention Program: ageappropriate prevention and education curriculums for area-schools and youth organizations, free of charge.
- Support Groups: offering five weekly support groups throughout the county, confidential, free of charge, in English and in Spanish.
- Link Program: a collaborative effort with the Orange County Department of Social Services to improve the safety of the victimized parent and children through centralized resources and shared expertise. The program is funded by New York State's Office of Children & Family Services.
- TASA: provided case-management services for pregnant and parenting teens. The program closed in November of 2011 due to the reorganization of Medicaid.
- Education and Prevention Programs: offered to community groups, workplaces, law-enforcement, government and service agencies, faith-groups, etc., in English and in Spanish.

FUNDRAISING

Celebration of Hope Dinner: Honoring the Newburgh Free Academy; Jewish Family Service; the Orange County Workplace Community, represented by the staff of Middletown's Mediacom, Wallace Oil, and West Point Graduates Association; Pamela O'Dea, SHOC's Youth Specialist; and shelter-renovation volunteers Michael Carano, Ken Buxton, Jim Platz and Phil Guttridge. Sponsored by Orange & Rockland and Crystal Run Healthcare, the event raised \$26,000.

2011 Services

- Love-Gently: The 17th edition of this annual family event gathered 200 supporters and raised \$6,500.
- Gingerbread Houses: The 7th annual holiday event raised \$1,050.
- Holiday Wish-List Adoption Program: 270 wishlists were adopted by community and faith groups, schools, businesses and individual donors.

SERVICES

- Safe Homes' Non-Residential Programs, through the Family Justice Center, served 445 new adult clients, 667 children; advocates worked with 3,556 clients on an ongoing basis.
- Safe Homes' Advocates provided 1,024 emergency services and 4,376 advocacy services in the areas of court accompaniment, law enforcement, medical and social services, housing, employment and education.
- Safe Homes' Advocates answered 4,394 hotline calls and 8,114 calls for information and referrals; advocates made 5,795 victim-outreach calls and follow-up calls on Domestic Incident Reports.
- Safe Homes' Education and Prevention Programs held 56 presentations, reaching an audience of approximately 2,162. The Teen Dating-Violence Prevention Program reached 2,439 teens.
- The Safe Homes' shelter provided services to 64 adult victims of domestic violence and 42 children.
- The Link Program received 373 referrals.
